

Flexibility, Sustainability, Livability

In mid-2014 Swanbury Penglase was approached by CIC Australia (now part of the Peet Group) to develop project home concepts at Lightsview. The Lightsview vision is to establish high-quality, contemporary urban development offering architecturally designed homes as a turn-key option for home buyers. It was an exciting opportunity that presented us with some stimulating challenges.

With sustainability very much in mind, the sites are typically small or narrow and are often bounded by neighbouring developments on two or even three sides. Clever thinking and the smart use of space is essential to ensure that the homes have plenty of natural light and a high degree of amenity.

We quickly evolved strategies using light wells, internal voids, clerestory windows and roof lights to meet this challenge, with natural ventilation boosted through careful positioning of opening windows and the creation of heat chimneys to exhaust hot air.

Significant to the success of the Lightsview development is the focus on housing diversity; each product is designed with multiple facade options and flexible layouts, allowing owners greater choice

Good planning has ensured that efficient circulation paths are distinct from functional zones. Combined with innovative solutions such as sliding walls it has allowed the owner flexibility to customise spaces to suit their needs

Simple measures such as the selection of materials and finishes, placement of windows and the use of applied projections and overhangs deliver a variety of building forms that can be provided with little or no structural modification. This is important in the context of the project home market where repetition affords greater building efficiency, translating to a "custom" result at a reduced cost to the consumer.

We are extremely proud of our association with Peet (and formerly CIC Australia), and our involvement in the delivery of project homes at Lightsview. The designs have proven to be highly popular, a testament to everyone involved.
