We are now firmly established in our brand new purpose built offices at 214 Gilbert St.

The site was formerly occupied by George Gross and Harry Who Fashion Designers, and when they announced in 2014 that they would be winding up their firm, it opened an opportunity that was eagerly seized by directors Steve and Andrew.

Staff were involved in the creative process from the very beginning: divided into teams, we all looked to the area surrounding the office to understand the context of our new space and how that might influence architectural form. The challenge was how to make the best of all the ideas and produce something with a unified design aesthetic.


As a practice we asked, 'what type of space would suit Swanbury Penglase? How can it be both aspirational and practical?' The result is 'the designers' workshop'.

The overall form is strong and angular, mimicking the saw-tooth profiles found elsewhere in this corner of the city and much like a workshop or shed.

Externally, the architecture is stripped back to fundamental components, with materials selected for their raw characteristics. Services are deliberately exposed and raw, without intervention to soften or disguise.

Internally the response builds on the raw nature of the external design, with most materials expressed in their own right and selected to contrast with the exterior. Intended to appear 'installed' and separate to the exterior skin, plywood emerged as the hero – its warm and gentle texture adds an inviting and natural dimension to the more austere steel and concrete structure of the open studio space.

A new office is an opportunity to shed 'baggage', focus on where we are headed and reinvent accordingly. For example, office furniture and equipment is used very differently now to 20 years ago; our new desks are sit-stand to promote a healthier workplace. Our industry is heavily based on software with very little paper being used these days which has allowed spatial arrangements to be more standardised and hence collaborative and flexible. Where possible we have sourced Australian designed and made furniture pieces from people like Ross Gardam and Design by Them. Although we loved 244 Gilbert, the new premises have been universally praised by the staff and we feel comfortable whilst remaining productive!
