Adelaide Town Hall Façade Conservation

On 29 November 1865, the Adelaide Town Hall tower – then the tallest structure in the city – was officially "topped out" with a suitable ceremony. Named the 'Albert Tower' in memory of Queen Victoria's late husband, more than thirty prominent invited guests climbed the timber scaffold at the contractors' invitation to hear speeches and drink toasts of sherry in celebration. The celebratory mood culminated in one adventurous guest clambering onto the finial and spinning atop its cast-iron ball. When the recent façade conservation works reached completion, today's regulations ensured the moment was celebrated rather more sedately.

After nearly two years veiled in scaffolding, the 160-year-old landmark has emerged revitalised having undergone critical conservation works. In addition to cleaning, repointing, render repairs, installation of protective cappings and repainting, it also proved necessary to structurally stabilise and replace portions of deteriorated stone. With the original quarry no longer available, matching stone was sourced


from salvaged material stockpiled from the demolition of the Port Road bridge over the Torrens more than thirty years ago. The project also required the complete dismantling and rebuilding of the tower's upper section above the cupola. This addressed both long-term weathering and the structural damage first caused by the 1902 earthquake and subsequent corrosion of internal ties.

It also provided an opportunity to gain deeper insight into its original construction, as the disassembly of components undertaken to address issues revealed unexpectedly sophisticated techniques and systems. Such challenges are seldom apparent in the completed work, as is appropriate.

The conservation of this civic icon stands as a testament to the patience and commitment of the City of Adelaide, the stewardship of Place PM, and the skill and dedication of Duratec, whose efforts – in collaboration with the Heritage Team at Swanbury Penglase – have ensured the Albert Tower will continue to stand proudly for generations to come.
